

Speed Skating Canada's national membership during the 2022-23 season was the organization's highest total since the 2017-18 season. Membership increased by 1,903 (16.86%) over last season, a jump that can be attributed to a post-Olympic spike in interest in our sport following Beijing 2022, as well as a continued return to normalcy following the COVID-19 pandemic.

SPORT SPURINPMENT

ATHLETES

Four athletes were successfully selected following the RBC Training Ground National Final 2022 to be part of the 2023 program. Speed Skating Canada currently has 8 athletes enrolled in the program.

COACHES

Over 200 speed skating coaches from across the country participated in training clinics and earned a new National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) level.

- 13 Certified Competition Development

OFFICIALS

20 officials were upgraded ahead of the 2022-23 season, with two officials being accepted to the ISU's International List. Over 70 National Officials received assignments to national competitions during the season, across the 130+ positions available.

Canada hosted four international competitions during the 2022-23 season, which resulted in greater mentorship and development opportunities for Canadian officials to experience this highest level of competition.

SAFE SPORT SPEAK UP LINE


As part of our continued commitment to fostering a safe and inclusive sport environment, Speed Skating Canada launched its Safe Sport Speak Up Line, a new independent reporting mechanism that supports the intake and management of complaints from all participants within the Canadian speed skating community.

ABUSE-FREE SPORT PROGRAM

Speed Skating Canada became a program signatory of the national Abuse-Free Sport Program through the Office of the Sport Integrity Commissioner (OSIC), Canada's independent system to prevent and address maltreatment in sport. Designated OSIC participants have now been fully onboarded and are subject to the UCCMS and OSIC policies and processes.

UPDATED POLICIES

To support the launch of these new Safe Sport reporting mechanisms, Speed Skating Canada released updated versions of its Code of Conduct, Complaints & Discipline Policy and Safe Sport Policy Manual. We have also officially adopted the Universal Code of Conduct to Prevent and Address Maltreatment in Sport (UCCMS) as a standalone policy.



WORLD CUPS

Canada finished the 2022-23 World Cup campaign with a total of 37 medals (15 gold, 15 silver, 7 bronze). It was the team's highest total since the 2015-16 season, when they earned 44 medals.

Courtney Sarault (2nd), Steven Dubois (3rd) and Pascal Dion (4th) each finished the season ranked in the top-5 overall. The men's and women's relay teams also captured the overall World Cup titles, winning a combined 10 medals, including four gold.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

Florence Brunelle captured three medals at the 2023 ISU World Junior Short Track Championships in Dresden, becoming only the second Canadian to reach the podium in all three individual distances at a single event. Ann-Sophie Bachand also brought home 500m silver for the second consecutive year.

Canada earned 10 medals at the 2023 ISU Four Continents Short Track Championships in Salt Lake City. Courtney Sarault, Steven Dubois, Pascal Dion, Claudia Gagnon, Rikki Doak and William Dandjinou all reached the individual distance podium, while the mixed and women's relays also medalled.

Canada won six medals at the 2023 ISU World Short Track Championships in Seoul. Steven Dubois (2), Courtney Sarault, Pascal Dion and Kim Boutin all earned individual distance medals, while the women's relay team of Boutin, Sarault, Rikki Doak, Claudia Gagnon and Renee Steenge finished their season on the podium as well.



WORLD CUPS

The Canadian team had one of its most successful World Cup seasons of the past decade, bringing home an impressive 30 medals (8 gold, 14 silver, 8 bronze) across six events.

Laurent Dubreuil (500m), Ivanie Blondin (Mass Start) and the women's Team Pursuit were crowned World Cup champions, while Dubreuil (1000m), Isabelle Weidemann (3000m/5000m) and Connor Howe (1500m) finished second overall in their distances.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

Daniel Hall won Canada's lone medal at the 2023 ISU World Junior Speed Skating Championships in Inzell, bringing home silver in the men's Mass Start.

Canada captured 14 medals on home ice at the 2023 ISU Four Continents Speed Skating Championships in Quebec City. Laurent Dubreuil, Antoine Gélinas-Beaulieu, Valérie Maltais, Béatrice Lamarche, Jordan Belchos, Alison Desmarais and Jake Weidemann all won individual distance medals, while both Team Pursuit and Team Sprint squads also reached the podium.

Canada won seven medals at the 2023 ISU World Speed Skating Championships in Heerenveen, including gold in the women's Team Pursuit, women's Team Sprint and men's Team Sprint; silver in the women's Mass Start (Ivanie Blondin), men's 500m (Laurent Dubreuil) and men's Team Pursuit; and bronze in the men's 10,000m (Ted-Jan Bloemen).

DOMESTIC EVENTS

A total of 17 domestic competitions were hosted during the 2022-23 season, including 9 in short track and 8 in long track.

Experienced host communities such as Montreal, Calgary, Sherbrooke and Quebec City were joined by newcomers Saskatoon, Oakville and Laval.

In October 2022, the Centre de glaces Intact Assurance hosted the first-ever joint Canadian Speed Skating Championships, a historic event combining the senior national championships in both short track and long track.

CANADA WINTER GAMES

In February 2023, over 200 speed skating athletes, coaches and officials took part in the 2023 Canada Winter Games in Prince Edward Island. The short track competition was hosted in North Rustico, while long track races took place off-island in Halifax.

SHORT TRACK

Coming off a successfully hosted ISU World Short Track Championships in April 2022, the Maurice-Richard Arena in Montreal welcomed back the world's best skaters for the first stage of the ISU World Cup Short Track circuit, which took place from October 28-30, 2022. Canadian skaters won an impressive 6 medals on home ice, including 2 gold, 3 silver and 1 bronze.

LONG TRACK

The world's top long track skaters made their debut at Quebec City's new Centre de glaces Intact Assurance during the ISU Four Continents Speed Skating Championships, which took place from December 2-4, 2022. It marked the city's first international speed skating competition in 30 years. Canadian skaters stole the show at this historic event, winning 7 gold, 1 silver and 6 bronze.

The Olympic Oval in Calgary would then host back-to-back ISU World Cup Speed Skating stops, from December 9-11, 2022 and December 16-18, 2022. Canada won a combined 12 medals across both events, including 2 gold, 5 silver and 5 bronze.

EVENT HOSTING

Thanks to active efforts from Speed Skating Canada, the ISU recently adopted a long-term event hosting plan. Canada is on track to host 14 international competitions through the 2026-27 season, including the ISU World Short Track Championships to be held in Montreal following the 2026 Olympic Games.



The inaugural Medals on Tour featured stops in six different provinces – Trois-Rivières, QC; Kamloops, BC; Saskatoon, SK; Winnipeg, MB; Toronto, ON and Dartmouth, NS – and offered members of the speed skating community and general public a unique opportunity to interact with Canadian national team athletes. On-ice and off-ice activities included public skating sessions, school visits, and events with local charities and community groups.

STAFF

With the support and direction of a collaborative Leadership Team – comprised of Terry Lockhart, Nicole Espenant, Mark Wild and Marc Schryburt – a total of 15 staff members (as of March 31, 2023) worked to drive the sport forward at a national level. Fourteen coaches and technical staff delivered the training and support that helped our national program athletes achieve success.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Eight Board members, under the guidance of President Blair Carbert, provided the organization with strong governance and critical support during a transition in staff leadership.
